Endress Installed As Vice-President

With these words, Dr. Villaume, President and Vice-Chancellor of WLU, before a gathering of students and faculty members, officially installed Dr. Henry Endress as Vice-President and Director of University Resources. Approximately 150 turned out to witness the solemn and colourful ceremony held Tuesday morning, February 26, in the Waterloo Lutheran University Theatre-Auditorium.

UNIVERSITY, A MISSION

Dr. Endress described himself as a product of a church related college. "It was in a campus such as this that I found myself in the Christian faith, . . . It was through such college relationships that I gained a sense of gratitude that sought to find expression through the years-and this is why I'm here."

His purpose in accepting the position was the feeling that "higher education is my mission."

He said, "I believe in a quality education in a Christian atmosphere offered not only to our own Lutheran youth but, as a great service of the Lutheran church, to all who come to our campus to prepare themselves for life intellectually and spiritually.'

The duties of Dr. Endress will be mainly to contact people locally and across Canada through various news media and personal visit and tell them of Waterloo University College.

VALUE INDEPENDENCE

In his speech welcoming Dr. Endress to service with the university, Students' Council President, Ron Erb, warned that there are many dangers when a university such as WLU experiences rapid growth. With rapid growth, he said, such things as student traditions often suffer and are neglected or trampled upon.

"Above all (students) respect their independence-their freedom to education, to plan their own activities and their own lives-and they guard it jealously."

If students need advice they will seek it and then, only when they feel they need it. But coercion, he said, will only result in rebellion. 'And so, there is no need for an open-door policy for students. When they need help, they will come and knock."

Welcoming speeches were also given by Mr. Harry D. Greb, Chairman of the Board of Governors, and Professor Clark, secretary of the Faculty Council.

Europe Approves W.U.C. Professor

Recently returned from an evangelism mission in Kentucky, Dr. John Warwick Montgomery announced that he will be carrying out research the next academic year at the University of Strasbourg under two of Europe's leading protestant scholars.

Dr. Montgomery's project, producing the first scholarly history of theological bibliography, has been accepted as a thesis topic by the University of Strasbourg. Dr. Montgomery will study under Professor le Doyen, Francois Wendel, one of the greatest living authorities on Calvin's theology and under . Professor Regin Prenter of Denmark, who has written a comprehensive study of Luther's concept of the Holy Spirit.

A second project Dr. Montgomery will complete in Europe is a translation of Louis Jacob de Saint-Charles' hitherto unedited history of

Dr. Montgomery has received a Canada Council post-doctoral grant of \$5,000 and a supplementary grant from W.L.U. to support him and his family while they are in Europe next year.

The University of Strasbourg approved Dr. Montgomery's candidacy for its theological doctorate without requiring him to take the usual preliminary examinations. On completing his thesis Dr. Montgomery should receive the degree of Docteur de L'Universite.

Assembly Speaker Anglican Clergyman

The Rev. Dr. Frank Nock, wellknown pastor of the Anglican Church in Ontario, will be the speaker for the monthly Religious Assembly to be held Tuesday, March 12, 9:50 a.m. in the Theatre-Auditorium. He has served for many years in the Algoma Diocese, largest in Ontario, which stretches from the Lakehead to North Bay. At present he is Rector of St. Luke's Cathedral in Sault St. Marie and Dean of Algoma.

Press for more committee work on Council so that problems are thoroughly researched before they are legislated upon.

Establish a position of Chief Electoral Officer to supervise all elections on campus.

Have a proper polling booth and a locked ballot box at all campus

Approach Student-Administration problems with a firm but reasonable attitude. Firmness tempered with reason and responsibility is always respected and often successful.

I urge each student to exercise his franchise tomorrow. Only by voting can you, the student show your interest in your activities.

versity watched the W.U.C. basketball squad succumb to Laurentian University by the score of 78-69.

Laurentian wins the championship of the O.AI.A.. basketball league as a result. To enter the finals the Hawks beat O.A.C. 61-46 while Laurentian overcame McMaster 74-

In the semi-finals game O.A.C. took an early 8 point lead but by half-time their advantage was cut to 27-26. After the half-time break there was no doubt about the result as the Hawks piled up a 40-30 edge with only five minutes gone in the second half. After that the Hawks were never in trouble as they put in reserves. The victory was marred by an injury to starting forward Bob Eaton. The injury was bad enough to keep him from playing the following night except for a brief appearance in the first half. The Hawks were led in the O.A.C. game by Bob Turner with 14 and Garry Cuff with Bob Woodburn and Court Heinbuck added 8 apiece.

In the championship tilt the game was a dogfight all the way. Laurentian broke in front 6-2 but the Hawks rallied and lead 11-8 after 6 minutes were played. This was the last time the Hawks were to lead in the ball game. Laurentian then relied on the brilliant performances of their two guards Horeck and Gibson to pull away to a 38-31 halftime lead. Horeck was especially tough in the first half as he put in 20 points from all points on the floor. In the second half Laurentian quickly increased their lead to 14 points but then the Hawks went to work. Lead by the fantastic shooting of Court Heinbuck and the rebounding of Turner and Cuff, the Hawks pecked away at the victors margin and with W.U.C.

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Large crowds at McMaster Uni- 6 minutes were within 3 points. But the Hawks couldn't come any closer than that and with BobWoodburn fouling out, Laurentian then increased their margin and ran out the clock to win 78-69. Horeck with 35 and Gibson with 17 sparked the winners while Court Heinbuck playing his finest game of the year lead the Hawks with 26. Bob Turner added 14, Garry Cuff, filling in ablely for injured Bob Eaton potted 9 while Bob Woodburn contributed 7.

The Hawks season is now at an end. They ended with a fine record of 17-7 and a finalist berth in the O.I. A.A. playoffs. This will have been the Hawks last appearance in the O.I.A.A. League.
